Thoughts From the Pastor

Brothers and sisters in Christ:

What are some things that people like about the winter season?

Some folks may say nothing!! However, some people like to go and play in the snow. Some others are just happy to see the mountains covered with snow so that we will have lots of water next summer. Some "snowbirds" use winter as an excuse to go to some place that is sunnier and warmer than around here.

One of the things that I like about the season of winter (which began this year on December 21, 2022) is that after a few days the amount of daylight we receive each day from the sun begins to increase. We are told that we start gaining a minute plus in the morning and a minute plus in the evening of day light each day. The bottom line is that the nights of darkness are getting shorter -- the sun is coming up earlier and going down later!!

I thank God for the various seasons of the year. They remind us that God keeps all His promises.

It is fitting that in the northern hemisphere the Christian church celebrates God's keeping His promise to send His Savior at the darkest time of the year -- as winter begins. The Gospel reading for January 22, 2023, (the 3rd Sunday after the Epiphany) mentioned that when Jesus began His earthly ministry, it was like a spiritual light had come on the

scene. Matthew 4 quotes from Isaiah chapter 9 as Jesus began His public ministry around the northern end of the Sea of Galilee.

And leaving Nazareth (Jesus) went and lived in Capernaum by the sea, in the territory of Zebulun and Naphtali, so that what was spoken by the prophet Isaiah might be fulfilled: "The land of Zebulun and the land of Naphtali, the way of the sea, beyond the Jordan, Galilee of the Gentiles—the people dwelling in darkness have seen a great light, and for those dwelling in the region and shadow of death, on them a light has dawned." From that time Jesus began to preach, saying, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand." (Matthew 4:13-17 ESV)

Jesus brought to those people who were mired down by sin and death, and without real spiritual hope for this life or the life to come, the refreshing love of God's Word. Jesus was like those rays of sunshine that return as the days of winter move along to springtime. Jesus brought hope, and joy, and peace, and healing, and forgiveness as He urged the people that He spoke with to repent because the kingdom of God had come in the person and work of Jesus Himself.

Jesus was bringing light which was able to shine on the only spiritual pathway that leads to eternal life in heaven. This was true for those who first heard Jesus on the north side of the Sea of Galilee, and its true for you and me too today as the world around us continually showers us with doom and gloom and the darkness of sin and death in all its many forms.

Even as Bethlehem Lutheran Church moves towards its final worship service, we still have this good news about Jesus to share with others. So, let's "bloom where we're planted" in this world for Jesus now and after we close. Let's continue to share the old, old story of Jesus and His love for everyone! May Jesus always use us to burst into people's lives -- unbelievers and believers alike -- with His light of forgiveness, life, and salvation that give joy and hope and peace!

And may the love of the Lord Jesus always be in your heart!

Put God and Love Above All This February

Although February is the shortest month of the year, it is one of the busiest. At Bethlehem Lutheran Church we begin the month with the evening Bible Study of Ephesians. The next day is Groundhog Day that gives us hope of an early Spring. February 12 is Abraham Lincoln's birthday, and it will be a very busy day: The Super Bowl and Everybody's Birthday Party following the church service. Then two days later is Valentine's Day. The next Sunday is Transfiguration Day, followed by President's Day, Shrove Tuesday and Ash Wednesday all in a row. Finally, the last Sunday of the month is the first Sunday of Lent and our Gideon speaker.

There have been four Presidents of the United States with February birth-days: Reagan, William Harrison, Lincoln and Washington, plus there are several birthdays of our church members. Additionally, February is Black History, Dental, Baking and Pizza month. Love, Hope, Faith and Unity seem to be the main theme of February. Love is both a gift of the Holy Spirit and a fruit of the Spirit.

I Corinthians 13:13 - "So now, faith, hope and love abide these three (after all other gifts have passed away) but the greatest of these is love."

Galatians 5:22 - "But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control."

Christianity was introduced to the Ephesians in the first Century AD by the Apostle Paul. He made it his headquarters as he traveled on his three missionary journeys. Paul taught at the Jewish synagogue that was over 300 years old, until the Jewish congregation refused to accept Christianity. So he contacted the Hellenized Jews and Gentiles, instead. The Apostle John with the Virgin Mary also came to Ephesus during King Agrippa I 's reign. The Christian population flourished at first. They became well known for their love, hope, faith, hard work and generosity toward each other, their community and other Christians abroad (especially Jerusalem).

Revelation 2: 2 - "I know your work, your toil and your patient endurance, and how you cannot bear with those that are evil."

The Ephesians endured patiently, hating the false prophets and the Nicolaitans and defending the Gospel, despite the opposition of the followers of Diana of the Ephesians (Diana's Temple was one of the 7 Wonders of the World). However, after the Apostle John and St. Paul were arrested, they lost their initial exuberant joy and love in their work, even

though both apostles wrote letters to them, telling them not to be discouraged. The Apostle Paul encouraged the Ephesians to return to what they once were; That as God's adopted children and brothers and sisters of Christ, they have been redeemed and have forgiveness of sins through grace. They were told to never lose heart as they go through tribulations and sufferings, but to stay strong, and united in the Lord, which is their glory. Paul sent Timothy and others to minister to them in their absence and later the Apostle John returned to them in his old age.

Ephesians 2:8 - "For you are saved through faith, and this is not your own doing; It is the gift of God, not as a result of works, so that no one may boast."

Ephesians 2:14 - "Jesus Christ is our peace, who has made us one and has broken down in his flesh, the dividing wall of hostility."

This message is for the Ephesians and for us today, as well. Christ has given us the wisdom and insight into God's mysterious will, the truth of the Gospel and the promise of the Holy Spirit. The mystery is that the Gentiles (non-Jews) are fellow heirs and members of the same body and partakers of the promise in Christ Jesus through the Gospel. We need to humbly serve each other as St. Paul did, strengthened by the power of the Holy Spirit and love of Christ that surpasses knowledge and be united to do good works in loving service to our families, fellow Christians and community. We need to walk as children of light, with humility, gentleness, patience and love, eager to maintain the unity of all who share one Lord, one faith and one baptism as children of God. We should not sin when we are angry, but sing songs of praise to God. Our first mission is to our own families to respect and love each other.

Romans 12:2 - "Be not conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewal of your mind, that by testing you may discern what is the good and acceptable and perfect will of God."

According to Revelation 2, which originally was a message to the 7 churches in Asia Minor, if we don't repent and change our ways from our own personal desires to the will of God, he will take away our "golden lampstand," (church), but if we conform to the will of God, we will be blessed with "the crown of life" and partake of "the tree of life."

"A New Day with Jesus"





Lutheran Hour Ministries had the only Christian float in this year's parade. They describe it: A new day is dawning on the Lutheran Hour Ministries float. As the sun rises up from behind the church, families are gathering to spend a New Day with Jesus. This float is cleverly designed to draw your eye upward through the stained glass to the top of the steeple, uplifting the soul. Their church doors are open as families surround themselves with giant flowers while Jesus welcomes them with stories of God's love. Riders represent 12 modern-day disciples receiving His teachings. The front of the float features a covered bridge with a Dove of Peace. Trail markers featuring Fruits of the Spirit guide them in the float's outdoor setting. Behind Jesus is a symbolic floral waterfall flowing from a cross. No matter what the world throws at us, the LHM float represents how faith can help all of us turn the corner.

Lutheran Hour Ministries "A New Day with Jesus" float won the Director's Award for most outstanding artistic design and use of floral and non-floral materials.

The Mission of the Lutheran Hour Ministries Float Committee is "To provide a Christian witness and hope in Jesus Christ to the un-churched, who view the float in person and through the media."

NEVER ON A SUNDAY! This year the Rose Parade and Rose Bowl were on January 2, not New Year's Day as usual. This is actually part of the "Never on a Sunday" tradition. The Rose Parade faced a dilemma in 1893, as New Year's Day fell on a Sunday. Parade organizers were afraid that the parade would spook the horses located outside of churches along the parade route for Sunday services. The "Never on a Sunday" exception has been observed ever since even though people no longer use horses to get around Pasadena (or anywhere obviously). This year was the 20th time the exception has come into play.

MISSION MESSAGE

I have been asked a few times, "Who are the Gideons?" I start out by saying, "They are the people who place the Bibles that you see in motel and hotel rooms." THE STORY BEHIND THE HYMN

Take My Life and Let It Be Written in 1874

Yet indeed I also count all things loss for the excellence of the knowledge of Christ Jesus my Lord, for whom I have suffered the loss of all things, and count them as rubbish, that I may gain Christ. Philippians 3:8



Frances Havergal 1836—1879

Although hymnist Frances Havergal, 36, had served the Lord for years, she felt something was missing in her Great Britain Christian experience. Then one day in 1873, she received a little book called, "All for Jesus," which stressed the importance of making Christ the King of every corner and cubicle of one's life. Soon thereafter, she made a fresh and complete consecration of herself to Christ.

Years later when asked about it, she replied, "Yes, it was on Advent Sunday, December 2, 1873, I first saw clearly the blessedness of true consecration. I saw it as a flash of electric light, and what you see you can never un-see. There must be a full surrender before there can be full blessedness."

Not long afterward, she found herself spending several days with ten people in a house, some of them unconverted. Others were Christians, but not fully surrendered to Christ. "Lord, give me all in this house," she prayed. She went to work witnessing, and before she left, all ten were yielded Christians. On the last night of her visit, Frances—too excited to sleep—wrote this great consecration hymn, "Take My Life...."


In the years that followed, Frances frequently used this hymn in her own devotions, especially every December 2, on the anniversary of her consecration.

On one occasion, as she pondered the words, "Take my voice and let me sing / Always only for my King," she felt she should give up her secular concerts. Her beautiful voice was in demand, and she frequently sang with the Philharmonic. But from that moment, her lips were exclusively devoted to the songs of the Lord.

On another occasion she was praying over the stanza that says, "Take my silver and my gold / Not a mite would I withhold." She had accumulated a great deal of Jewelry, but she now felt she should donate it to the Church Missionary Society. Writing to a friend, she said, "I retain only a brooch for daily wear, which is a memorial so my dear parents; also a locket with the holy portrait I have of my niece in heaven. Evelyn, I had no idea I

had such a jeweler's shop; nearly fifty articles are being packed off. I don't think I need to tell you I never packed a box with such pleasure."

Have you given your whole life-everything-over to Jesus? Why not make this the date of your own complete consecration?

Abounding in Love

May the Lord make you increase and abound in love for one another and for all (1 Thessalonians 3:12a).

It is not always easy to abound in love. There are days when it is not easy to abound in love. Abounding in love seems impossible when a spouse has forgotten to take out the trash or the children bicker over a toy or gadget. Yet, Christ says in John 15:12: **This is my**

commandment, that you love one another as I have loved you. We don't have a choice to love or not.

We are the redeemed children of God. We are loved by God who has given His Son for us. He is there to help us love others. He made love an action verb. He leads us to actively love others. In our families a hug and a kind word actively show love for one another. In times of stress and frustration, however, this is not easy to do. At these times, a special Bible verse can be brought to mind: God's love has been poured into our hearts through the Holy Spirit who has been given to us (Romans 5:5b). This verse is a comfort when it seems impossible to love someone else. God pours His love into us. By His help it will overflow.

When a co-worker seems to be deliberately hurtful and obstinate instead of helpful; when a neighbor allows her dog to run loose in your garden; when a teacher at school is less than understanding to a child you love; these are times God gives us the opportunity to practice love. At times like these we can love a person as God has commanded or take vengeance as God has commanded us not to do in Leviticus 19:18: You shall not take vengeance or bear a grudge against the sons of your own people, but you shall love your neighbor as yourself; I am the LORD.

The Holy Spirit works in us to give us strength to show love to those who at times are unlovable. We can show God's love to the co-worker by taking him or her a cup of coffee and by giving him or her your willing ear to listen. We can show God's love to the neighbor by taking her a plant or a bouquet of flowers from your garden. We can show God's love to the teacher by volunteering to help with a classroom project. These are ways to share the overflowing love God has poured into our hearts.

By the power of the Holy Spirit, this love can overflow into our communities through random acts of kindness. Take cookies to a business that you

patronize. Volunteer at a non-profit in your area. Keep smiling at the grocery store and invite the person with a fussy child to go in front of you in line. Christ looked at individuals and saw their need and helped them. God works in us and helps us to look at people to see what their need might be so that we can help them and show them His love.

Praying for family, friends, and strangers is also a great way to spread God's love. To pray for the drunk driver, the terrorist, the unfriendly nemesis, as well as the victim, is not easy but they too are part of the "all" our Lord commands us to love. Even when what to pray seems impossible, God takes over. God's Word promises us, *Likewise the Spirit helps us in our weakness. For we do not know what to pray for as we ought, but the Spirit himself intercedes for us with groanings too deep for words* (Romans 8:26).

Lord, help us walk Your servant way

And, bending low, forgetting self,
Each serves the other's needs.


We sang Auld Lang Syne and watched slide show of photos from the past 13 years of New Years Eve game nights.
