Bethlehem's Legacy of Faith: The Final Edition April 2024

The corporation of Bethlehem Evangelical Lutheran Church in Renton, Washington, established on October 15, 1942, has been officially dissolved. The dissolution documents were successfully filed and accepted with the Washington Office of the Secretary of State on March 5, 2024. Our last worship service was held on Sunday April 30, 2023.

Your Closing Team worked faithfully during the last year to sell the building and property, help members relocate to other churches, support those in care facilities, assist with member funerals at other locations, find good homes for our sacred objects, distribute the money to other churches and charitable organizations according to the will of the congregation, ship archive papers to St Louis for safekeeping, and keep members informed throughout each milestone. Their work has ended.

This newsletter features highlights of the closing process and celebrates that while Bethlehem is no longer, our legacy continues, and God's Word and His love for us are forever.

After Eighty Years, Bethlehem Lutheran Church Continues to Serve God's Kingdom By Joel Jackman

The term "Legacy" is most often understood to be money or property designated in a Will. Bethlehem recently donated more than \$2 million to 24 charities and churches. But our Legacy is much more profound than a number, even as significant as that number is. Bethlehem's "Legacy" represents the growth of God's gifts to the congregation for more than 80 years. He has blessed us with pastors, lay leaders, workers, income, property, and opportunities to serve our members and His people in our community and around the world. Many of you are already serving in new roles at the churches you are attending.

God's gifts are being spread like seeds to grow in new locations. When we contacted the various charities to let them know they would receive a gift from our congregation, they expressed concern for our members during this difficult transition and told us how much the donations meant to them. It gives us a profound feeling of joy and hope to realize that Bethlehem's 80-year Legacy still lives to serve God's Kingdom in more ways than we will ever know.

The whole "Purchase and Sale Agreement" document production was something way out of my experience. Any little change in wording or circumstance needed a revision. Then it was a flurry of activity then wait, flurry of activity then wait. Then when all the I's were dotted and T's crossed, money was deposited and it came down to Head Trustee, Curtis Holcomb, signing or initialing two stacks of documents and sweating the whole time.

Concordia Historical Institute tells the story of our Lord's gracious dealings with His people in the Lutheran Church. We were excited to know that the important documents from Bethlehem Lutheran Church will be added to their archives to be preserved for all time. In talking with one of the reference and researcher supervisors, I learned the care they take with the documents to preserve them.

Our baptism, confirmations, and marriages recorded from 1942 to our current ones in 2023 will be available for research. The records of the beginning of our church as well as the closing documents, the information about our officers, boards, and committees are also preserved. We may be closed but our legacy will live on forever.

The most meaningful thing for me about our closing is to see how the Holy Spirit continues to carry out God's plans for Bethlehem.

When we made the decision to close, we started the process of finding new homes for our possessions like the organ, the Christus Rex, the bells, banners, hymnals, bibles, etc. At first it felt sad to let these things go, but that sadness turned to Joy to see how much the churches and charities valued and appreciated these gifts from Bethlehem. And it gives solace to know that our church and property are being used by the thriving Moldovan congregation to continue God's work.

The blessings that God bestowed on Bethlehem over the years are now being used to expand God's Kingdom in ways that we never expected. Here's just one example:

Our contact at Lutheran World Relief told us that their workers in Uganda were teaching farmers new techniques in organic coffee farming, including "stumping," where the farmer cuts the plant back to the stump. This prevents the plant from growing fruit (coffee) for a couple of seasons, but when it grows back it does so tenfold and yields much more coffee for the farmer.

He shared with me, "The decision to close Bethlehem Lutheran Church, was painful I'm sure, but like the coffee plant, will produce much more fruit for our global neighbors and hopefully for you all too".


I think He led us to where he wanted our things to go.

Brothers and sisters in Christ:

As I put these thoughts together, it has almost been one year since the congregation once operating as Bethlehem Lutheran Church in Renton, Washington held its last worship service at the end of April 2023.

All of us have now scattered to the 4 winds as it were. Some of us may see each other on a weekly basic as you are worshipping the Lord and Savior Jesus Christ together. Others of us may still be looking around for a new church home. Sandy and I don't get to our home congregation (Saint Timothy Lutheran Church—Edmonds, Washington) very often because I am still able to assist other congregations when their pastor takes time off or when the congregation is vacant (as I am doing now at Lamb of God Lutheran

Church in Seattle). God may have transferred some of our brothers and sisters in Christ to heaven through death since we worshipped together as a congregation.

It was good for me to review what I wrote for the last newsletter of the congregation. I pray that these thoughts from that newsletter are useful for you on your faith journey to eternal life in heaven with Jesus. I began with this question:

"What are we to do as disciples of Jesus Christ after April 30, 2023?"

That question was then answered beginning with this paragraph:

"A number of the Bible verses have been going through my mind as Bethlehem Lutheran Church approaches its last service and then the selling of its property. One set of verses that stood out is 1 Thessalonians 5, verses 16-18. **Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you.** (1 Thessalonians 5:16-18 ESV)"

After a couple of pages of my thoughts on these verses and how they applied to the situation after Bethlehem Lutheran Church – Renton, Washington is closed, I concluded with the following words that still are relevant for us today:

"So especially now and in the days ahead, **we thank** our great God and heavenly Father, **with joy** in our heart, that He has brought us His dear children to faith in His Son Jesus Christ. At this time, we **especially** thank God for all the lives that have been touched by the Gospel of Jesus Christ over the past 80 plus years through the efforts of Bethlehem Lutheran Church in this part of the world.

"May the peace and love and words of the Good Shepherd, Jesus Christ, continue to keep us faithful to Jesus, comfort us now, and continue to guide us on our journey down the narrow path to heaven.

"After April 30, 2023, wherever we might be worshipping our living Lord and Savior, may the Holy Spirit help us disciples of Jesus Christ to continue to **rejoice always**, **pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; because this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you.**"

Christ is risen! He is risen indeed -- hallelujah!

May the love of the Lord Jesus always be in your heart!

The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ and the love of God and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you all. (2 Corinthians 13:14 ESV)

Ellen's and my father, William (Bill) Weigelt, charter member of Bethlehem, passed away May 31, 1962. Shortly thereafter, Pastor Russert presented a scale model of a Christus Rex to the Weigelt family for approval to use Bill's memorial money. We were thrilled with the idea and the congregation approved. In October of the same year, the Christus Rex was dedicated. It adorned Bethlehem's altar for 61 years. Beautiful!

In finding new homes for Bethlehem's valued possessions, it appeared there were no local churches wanting/needing this cross. I've kept in touch with the Russert family in Illinois and called Paul Russert, the second son of Pastor Russert, to inform him of the current situation at Bethlehem and whether his congregation would be interested in the Christus Rex Cross. He was thrilled! As a child, he remembers when it arrived at Bethlehem and he touched Jesus' face. Without hesitation, he assured us that his congregation would approve.

The Moldovans removed the cross from the wall and carefully laid it on the floor by the altar, ready for the movers to ship. When Craters & Freighters arrived to pack the cross for shipping, a mover seemed to notice the anxiety on our faces and stopped what he was doing to state, "I am a Christian, and I will take care of this cross."

It arrived at the <u>Risen Savior Lutheran Church</u> in Manteno, IL in good condition and was rededicated Church. Karen Jackman, John, Paul, & Luther on July 30, 2023. What an appropriate name for a church to have a beautiful cross, the Christus Rex, truly displaying the risen Savior.

It is a joy to know that it has gone full circle, so to speak, from Luther Russert at Bethlehem, WA in 1962 to his son, Paul Russert, at Risen Savior, Manteno, IL in 2023.

Dear Friends in Christ,

As I consider Bethlehem's closing almost a year after the fact, the words "memories" and "mission" come to mind. Speaking personally, I have fond memories of visiting Bethlehem to fill in on numerous occasions. I found the people of Bethlehem to be gracious, welcoming, and *flexible*. I think Bethlehem's "flexibility" was on display most keenly the day that a bird decided to join the worship service – landing on the altar and fluttering around the sanctuary. The experience that morning reminded me of a passage from Psalm 84:3. I shared that passage in the announcements that morning when it became evident that the bird wouldn't take the hint and fly through the side doors that were left open for just that reason. Psalm 84:3 reads, "**Even the sparrow has found a home, and the swallow a nest for herself**,

where she may have her young – a place near your altar, O Lord Almighty, my King and my God" (NIV). Because God's people "had their eyes fixed on Jesus" (Heb. 12:2), the bird and its antics were only a mild amusement vs. a distraction from what was really important that morning.

When Bethlehem closed, many shared their memories with me and how Bethlehem had been their spiritual home. Bethlehem is where they, to borrow the image from Psalm 84:3, **"found a place near the altar"** and received God's Word and sacraments in that place for many, many decades. Memories of being at Bethlehem are treasured memories. Baptisms, confirmations, weddings, and even funerals were all part of the life of the congregation. I continue to give thanks to God for those memories as I'm sure you do, as well.

Over the last year, I have been reminded of another passage in the Bible that references sparrows. In Matthew 10:29, Jesus says, "Are not two sparrows sold for a penny? And not one of them will fall to the ground apart from your father" (ESV). I have watched how God has cared for the people of Bethlehem as the congregation closed and Bethlehem's members have become part of the mission of other churches. I have provided pastoral care and support to the families of Betty Cowan, Carolyn Hough, and Bob Pankow who have gone to be with the Lord. As I write this, I hope and pray that the members of Bethlehem stay in communication with each other to encourage one another in the Lord - especially for those who may not have found a new church to call home. Because of my work with LMSN and my ability to do pulpit supply, I have seen how Bethlehem members have become active in the mission and ministry of area congregations. God continues to do good things in the lives of the people of Bethlehem and through their faithful service. Your presence, faithfulness, and giftedness is a blessing to the churches you have joined. Finally, I have seen how the generosity that Bethlehem was able to provide after the sale of their property has blessed many area ministries - including Lutheran Ministry Services Northwest. Thank you! God's people continue to be blessed through you.



I'll close with the words of Hebrews 12:1-2, "Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight, and sin which clings so closely, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus, the author and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy that was set before him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is seated at the right hand of the throne of God" (ESV).

DONATIONS OF ITEMS

The legacy team was tasked with relocating all items in the building. That's 80 years of stuff that we had accumulated; 65 years of which were in this building on Monroe.

We walked through the building with the new owners, and they had only 1 request. We could remove anything or everything but if there were any leftover <u>English language Bibles</u>, they would love having them available for their youth. We said yes to the Bibles, and they willingly accepted the other items that we left them. It was big things like the pews, two pianos, kitchen appliances, lawn mowers & tools, photo copier, big screen TV & cabinet, file cabinets, tables and chairs. They appreciated getting the USA and Christian flags, and janitorial and office supplies.

The new church congregation had their own sacred items and did not need our Christus Rex statue, altar, baptism font, organ, communion ware, banners or hymnals.

There were so many "coincidences" along the way that the team felt God leading the distribution of items from Bethlehem to their new homes.

- A local church was looking into purchasing hand bells; we had hand bells and music.
- Another local church was in need of a new organ; we had an organ.
- A Christian halfway house wanted to conduct baptisms; we had a baptismal font.
- Another Bethlehem Lutheran Church had always wanted a different outdoor sign; we had an outdoor sign that said Bethlehem Lutheran Church on it.
- The divine intervention of our Christus Rex statue is mentioned on page 10.

And so it went. We were also touched by the people in the organizations who received our items. Without exception, they stated they were saddened by our closure, and many offered to pray for our members in finding new church homes.

We want to give a shout out to Pastor Richard Flath, Deaconess Ruth Ann Shimoi, and James Hing. With their many connections throughout the area, they were instrumental in helping find churches who needed our things. They also did a lot of deliveries for us!

There isn't room to list EVERY item. We've included some of the highlights.

The <u>rugged cross</u> that we used during Lent and adorned with flowers on Easter was given to Hope Lutheran in Woodburn, OR, a church familiar to Pastor Flath.

The <u>red lamp and eternity candles</u> were given to Lutheran Chapel on the Hill in Granite Falls, WA.

<u>Choir music</u> was given to Messiah Lutheran in Seattle & Peace Lutheran in Covington.

2024 marks 20 years of service with Lutheran Bible Translators for my wife Eshinee and I. My work has manifested as short, seemingly isolated projects. Even someone who has followed us closely over these 20 years might not see the themes and connections of my part of the ministry. [It's all been] for the glory of God. Lord willing, I will continue as long as He allows.

I first encountered the Naro people of Botswana in 2006. They live on the western edge of the Kalahari desert. I recorded a CD of Christian songs in their language which was used as their fund raiser. In 2013, the translation team finished their translation of the Psalms. We worked with professional and church choirs from the Naro-speaking community to create new songs from the Psalms. These recordings were distributed for free. Soon one could attend a Naro church service where often the whole service was spent singing Psalms. They are still being sung, 11 years later.

In Kosovo and Albania, the Albanian speaking majority is culturally Muslim, though largely secular in religious belief after several generations of religious suppression under the Soviet Union. It is very difficult for an Albanian to come to Christianity in Serbian Orthodoxy. Still, Albanians in Albania are coming to Christ. And some have come to Kosovo to reach others.

in Peja, Kosovo there is a single non-denominational Christian church with about 100 members. In a city of 100,000 people. They recognized the need for new original songs which would address the themes and concerns of their community. In 2018, they invited a team—which included me—from the ministry Inspiro to work with local musicians

to create new songs. The song creators would mostly be Albanian musicians pulled from the worship bands from around Kosovo. Several were missionaries from Albania. At the end of the week, there were nine new songs. Later in Tirana, Albania, another 12 new Albanian worship songs were created.

Operators of a Christian after-school club in Albania felt the kids needed songs with solid Biblical foundations which were easy to sing that talked about how much God loved them and who Jesus was, since both the love of God and the person of Jesus were things that the kids would not otherwise hear about. I returned in 2019 with a different Inspiro team and a larger enthusiastic group of local musicians. The team agreed that if we could come up with eight songs over the course of a three-day workshop, that would be amazing. We got 25.

In 2020, of course, no one went anywhere.

Then, in 2023, they put on a concert to a packed house in Kosovo. One of the original team organizers told me, "*Many said that they always had this dream and prayer to have a local Christian concert in Kosovo. It was beautiful to see how many knew the songs and were*

singing them." She told me how powerful it was to see people from different denominational traditions in a spirit of unity.

The team continues to record new songs composed by those who they met in and through these workshops. And while they can certainly do all of this without me, I do hope to return one more time.

I've recorded Audio Bibles in many languages: the Dhimba New Testament in Opuwo, Namibia, the book of Luke in Shekgalagari, several books in Bugakhwe, and Scripture selections in Shiyeyi. In 2018, I began my largest audio scripture project, the full Bible in Khoekhoegowab. This is a San language spoken by nearly 200,000 people in Namibia. I predicted that I could record a New Testament in three months and an Old Testament in six. Working solo, those months would be very intensive. I could record readers for only 4-5 hours each day. Each hour of recording (depending on the caliber of the reader) would yield one to three hours of editing. So, a day with five hours of recording could require twenty hours of work to keep up. On these recording trips, I could work 12-16 hours each day, six to seven days a week.

By the end of three months, it was clear that I shouldn't try to take on a project of that length and intensity again. In addition, it also became clear that this was not a one-off project, but the beginning of an effort to create audio Bibles in all the languages of Namibia. As I could only get a three-month work visa each year, I would need twelve consecutive years to finish the task.

Or I could teach someone else to do it. With approval, I began training a young lady who had been one of the readers to also record and edit recordings. For part of the time, she would record while I edited. But once she became comfortable with editing recordings, she became much better at it than me—mainly because she understood the languages.

I became a technical resource, answering tech support questions sent on WhatsApp. She did the recordings and edits while I did the final mastering work from my home studio in the US. She recorded a whole children's Bible in four languages almost completely on her own.

I find myself moving more into a recording-engineer *training* mode. I've done trainings in Kenya and Tanzania. On one hand, this means I don't get to spend as much time in the field hands-on with the recording and editing of new audio Bible recordings. On the other hand, I get to see that work multiplied as I train people in their own communities to do the work faster and better than I ever could have.

I've had the joy to be involved in these and other projects in these 20 years. **I have valued our partnership.** Thank you and may God bless each of you in your own ministry in the years to come.

Bob Pankow passed away Wednesday morning, April 3, 2024 at his care facility in Seattle. Bob was 88 years old and had been on hospice since February of this year.


