LIVING IN PRAYER | God and I — Just the Two of Us!

But when you pray, go into your room, close the door and pray to your Father, who is unseen. Then your Father, who sees what is done in secret, will reward you (Matt 6:6)

Where do you pray? When do you pray? Do you have a specific scheduled prayer time with God? Jesus gave the best examples for teaching us how and where to pray. He went to the mountain and prayed all night before He choose "the 12 disciples." (Luke 6:12) At the Mount of Olives He separated Himself from the others, knelt down and prayed. (Luke 22:41) He woke up early and went alone into the wilderness to pray. (Mark 1:35)

When Jesus lived on earth, He set prayer as a priority in His life. We can learn from His example. Some people set their alarm clock 10 minutes earlier than necessary and use those extra minutes as a personal prayer time with God; others set a specific time and enjoy the comfort of a favorite chair with their Bible and devotional books. Ask your family to honor your prayer time and request no interruptions. What a wonderful example for your children, to see their parents spending time in prayer to the Lord.

BETHLEHEM IS CLOSING

At a special voters' meeting on October 30, 2022, 36 of the eligible 53 voting members (68%) met to vote whether to close our congregation next year or continue. Secret balloting was conducted in person and via a Zoom poll. Years of meetings, research, and discussion culminated in the decision to close. The vote was 83% in favor of closing with 1 abstention. The exact closing date will be voted on at a later date.

At our annual meeting on November 6, we elected officers & approved next year's budget hopeful that we will be able to call a part-time pastor to help guide us through our final year.

WHAT'S NEXT?

President Don Kuhlmann reports we will have frequent all-member meetings and discussion groups to keep everyone apprised of the status. While we have newly established teams to do research and identify all the steps that are required to close a church, the voting assembly will be making the major decisions.

The December all-member meeting is scheduled for Monday, December 12 at 6:30pm via Zoom and Wednesday, December 14 at 9:30am in-person. You can attend either session or both. To be informed, have a chance to get your questions answered, and learn how you can help, it's recommended you attend the meeting.

WHAT ARE THE TEAMS?

Teams have been created that we hope will help make things operate smoothly. The teams have met a few times, established some goals, and made some progress. They are eager to gain a few assistants. If you want to help as you can in a specific area for a short-term assignment, let the team leader know. Assistants aren't obligated to attend the team meetings but should be reliable, able to work independently, and report on their results.

The Gift of Christmas

The gifts of the Spirit have always existed as the Holy Spirit has always been part of the Trinity of God. Though, they were not recognized by many before Jesus came down to earth to dwell among people. God's Prophets were filled by the Holy Spirit in the Old and New Testament. However, the pouring out of the Holy Spirit came at Pentecost.

What are the gifts of the Holy Spirit? Prophesy, Apostleship, Teaching, Wisdom, Understanding, The Word of Knowledge, Administration, Government, Operations, Miracles, Discerning of Spirits, Tongues, Interpretation of Tongues, Prayer, Helps, Hospitality, Healing, Faith, and Love. (1 Corinthians 12;13:4-8; 1 Peter 4:9).

As the Holy Spirit grows in a believer, the results are the fruit of the Spirit: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. We are to use our gifts with these fruit to serve others.

In the Bible before Christ's birth we see gifts as portrayed in many ways: Dowries, Inheritance, Gifts to Children, Taxes and Tributes to Kings, Bribes, Extortion, Rewards, Peace Offerings between Kingdoms, sometimes Prostitution, Tithes, Offerings and Sacrifices to God through the High Priests and Levites. However, were these gifts given by duty or with love?

What is love? There is sexual love (Eros), brotherly love (Philos) and God's love (Agape). Agape can only be experienced through God. He has given us Gifts of Love through the Gifts of the Spirit. We can share love by thinking of others before ourselves. This cannot happen without God's Agape. We can give back to God lovingly and to others through God's Spirit that dwells within us.

THE STORY BEHIND THE HYMN





Charles Wesley 1707—1788 England

Written in 1739

Then the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid, for behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy which will be to all people." Luke 2:10

Upon his conversion, Charles Wesley immediately began writing hymns, each one packed with doctrine, all of them exhibiting strength and sensitivity, both beauty and theological brawn. He wrote constantly, and even on horseback his mind was flooded with new songs. He often stopped at houses along the road and ran in asking for "pen and ink."

He wrote over 6,000 hymns during his life, and he didn't like people tinkering with the words. In one of his hymnals, he wrote: "I beg leave to mention a thought which has been long upon my mind, and which I should long ago have inserted in the public papers, had I not been unwilling to stir up a nest of hornets. Many gentlemen have done my brother and me (though without naming us) the honor to reprint many of our hymns. Now they are perfectly welcome to do so, provided they print them just as they are. But I desire they would not attempt to mend them, for they are really not able. None of them is able to mend either the sense or the verse. Therefore, I must beg of them these two favors: either to let them stand just as they are, to take things for better or worse, or to add the true reading in the margin, or at the bottom of the page, that we may no longer be accountable either for the nonsense or for the doggerel of other men."

But one man did the church a great favor by polishing up one of Charles' best loved hymns. When Charles was 32, he wrote a Christmas hymn that began:

Hark, how all the welkin rings, "Glory to the King of kings; Peace on earth, and mercy mild, God and sinners reconciled!" Joyful, all ye nations, rise,

Join the triumph of the skies; Universal nature say, "Christ the Lord is born today!"

The word "welkin" was an old English term for "the vault of heaven." It was Charles' friend, evangelist George Whitefield, who, when he published this carol in his collection of hymns in 1753, changed the words to the now -beloved, "Hark! The Herald Angels Sing."

Hymnary.org describes the hymn: Rather than simply tell the nativity story, Wesley pours theological truths into this text. The first verse tells the story of the angels proclaiming Christ's birth, and the second and third verse go on to make it very clear why the angels sang. Simply by describing Christ, Wesley tells us the entire Gospel story. We are told of Christ's nature, his birth and incarnation, his ministry, and his salvific purpose.

The Psalter Hymnal Handbook describes the hymn like this:
"A curious mixture of exclamation, exhortation, and theological reflection. The focus shifts rapidly from angels, to us, to nations. The text's strength may not lie so much in any orderly sequence of thought but in its use of Scripture to teach its theology. That teaching surely produces in us a child-like response of faith; we too can sing 'Glory to the newborn King!"

This is hymn number 380 in our Lutheran Service Book.

Twelve Days of Christmas

And when they saw it, they made known the saying that had been told them concerning this child. And all who heard it wondered at what the shepherds told them. But Mary treasured up all these things, pondering them in her heart.

Luke 2:17-19

Merry Christmas! It's still Christmas! Whether you receive a partridge in a pear tree or not, there are twelve days in the season of Christmas before we observe the visit of the Magi on January 6. That's twelve days to continue to celebrate our Lord's birth. While the world seeks to put the Christmas items on clearance and push the Valentine's Day gear already on December 26, we, Christians can continue to belt out our Christmas carols and boldly display our exterior illumination. But continuing the celebration of our Savior's birth is about more than just twelve additional days of cookies and lights. It is about marveling at the wonder of God dwelling in the flesh. It is about treasuring the Word and promises of God and pondering them in our own hearts. It is about a life shaped and formed by Christ, where He is the center of our days and our lives.

Sadly, this type of devotion should not be limited to twelve days either. The birth of Christ forever changes the lives of Joseph and Mary, Simeon and Anna, shepherds and all who have been told about the birth of the Christ child. The gathering of families around the Word of God in sanctuaries and at kitchen tables should not be confined to a couple of special occasions, but, by God's grace, can become the center of our lives.

May the Good News of our Savior's birth continue to bring joy and peace to your home as you ponder the mystery of God dwelling upon the earth in human form to offer Himself on the cross in our place. May this message remain in your homes, in your ears and hearts, and on your lips as we celebrate Christ throughout all the seasons of the year and life.

Prayer - O God, our Maker and Redeemer, You wonderfully created us and in the incarnation of Your Son yet more wondrously restored our human nature. Grant that we may ever be alive in Him who made Himself to be like us; through Jesus Christ, our Lord, who lives and reigns with You and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen.
