Thoughts From the Pastor

Brothers and Sisters in Christ:

The Lenten Season began this year on Ash Wednesday, February 22. This will be the last Lenten season for Bethlehem Lutheran Church in Renton, Washington. Over the past 80 years there have been many themes that were looked at during the Lenten season. I thought it wise to close our midweek Lenten services by reviewing again the 7 last statements that Jesus Christ made as He suffered on the cross before He died.

One of the other things that is often mentioned during Lent is pain – the pain that our Lord and Savior went through on our behalf as He suffered on the cross. A familiar reading during Lent that speaks about the pain that Jesus Christ went through is Isaiah 53. We read in Isaiah 53 verses 4 and 5 the following:

Surely He has borne our griefs and carried our sorrows; yet we esteemed Him stricken, smitten by God, and afflicted. But He was pierced for our transgressions; He was crushed for our iniquities; upon Him was the chastisement that brought us peace, and with His wounds we are healed. (ESV)

Then we read or hear the accounts of Jesus Christ's crucifixion from the 4 Gospels. It's more about His pain, and finally His death on the cross. We need to hear and read about Jesus Christ's pain and what He

went through to remind us that sin is no joking matter. At times we may think that sinning is nothing, but God doesn't. God laid all our sins (and the sins of everyone else) on His dear Son, Jesus Christ so that we would never have to face the holy wrath of God.

Why did Jesus go through all that pain?

In Hebrews 12:2 (ESV) we read this: "... Jesus, the Author and Perfecter of our faith, who for the joy that was set before Him endured the cross, despising the shame, ...". Jesus endured all that pain for the joy that would come through His suffering and death. Jesus' joy is in the fact that you and I believe that He died for us and that He paid the price for our sins. By faith we believe in Him as our Savior, and that we are now His forgiven and redeemed brothers and sisters.

Jesus went through all those pains because He loves all people. Jesus loves you, and Jesus loves me. And Jesus is gracious and forgiving to all.

Therefore, we join with believers of all times and places to thank Jesus Christ for enduring all that pain so that we might live with Him eternally in heaven. As a hymn writer put it: "Thousand, thousand, thanks shall be, dearest Jesus, unto Thee" (LSB 420 refrain).

May the love of the Lord Jesus always be in your heart!

UBUNTU

An anthropologist showed a game to the children of an African tribe. He placed a basket of delicious fruits near a tree trunk and told them: "The first child to reach the tree will get the basket."

When he gave them the start signal, he was surprised that they walked together, holding hands until they reached the tree and shared the fruit!

When he asked them why they did that when any one of them could have had the basket only for themselves! They answered with astonishment: "Ubuntu"...that is, how can one of us be happy while the rest are miserable? "Ubuntu" in their language means: "I am because we are". That tribe knows the secret of happiness that has been lost in societies that consider themselves "civilized societies"...!!

At a recent council meeting, we reviewed this document from Synod. It gave us assurance that the decision to close, while painful, is the best decision for the Kingdom. Excerpt of the article is below:

How to Decide When A Church Should Close

The viability of a particular congregation's organization and its property may come to a time when it becomes necessary to consider closure. However, this in no way communicates a lack of God's care for His church or the failure of His people.

The closure of a congregation needs to receive careful consideration. Congregations can discuss the following questions.

- Is our congregation's worship attendance in severe decline?
- Is the average age of our congregation increasing?
- Is there a complete absence of infants and small children?
- Is there is absence of baptisms of children and adults?
- Is there an absence of youth confirmations?
- Is there is absence of adult confirmations?
- Is there an absence of an organized effort to engage the community and include new people into the life of the congregation?
- Is the number of people available to fill roles of leadership less than the number of needs roles to be filled?
- Is there a significant loss of financial giving?
- Are there important property issues failing to receive needed attention in our congregation due to lack of funding and/or interest?
- Has the local community changed and our congregation is unable or unwilling to engage the changes with needed ministry?
- Is our congregation more focused on surviving as an organization or institution than it is on growing in faith and knowledge in Christ and finding ways to engage people in the community with Christ?
- Will sharing a pastor with neighboring congregation truly engage our congregation in mission and ministry or is it only a way to share costs and postpone closure?
- Will being served by a part-time pastor truly engage our congregation in mission and ministry or is it only a way to share costs and postpone closure?

Consideration of these questions and others like them can generate conversation that must occur if closure is to be pondered. The decision to look toward a closure should be based on what is best for the Kingdom, not just on emotions over the loss of an institution. However, the recognition of such emotions and spiritually addressing them must occur.

Emotions

The potential closure of a church is a matter which fosters a great deal of emotion and sadness. In the midst of these emotions, it should be stressed that the closure is being <u>undertaken with a spirit of thanksgiving to God for His blessings to and through the congregation during its years of life and service.</u>

The members should be encouraged to recognize that although organizations change, His grace does not, and the ministry of Word and Sacrament can be provided for them through other congregations nearby.

From "Being Smart About Congregational Change," page 46, "The end, while sad, is also a time for acknowledging God's work in the life of the congregation and God's continuing work through the congregation's legacy. However, while a good death is a laudable goal, it is also a radical goal. Many congregations won't consider this option since it seems to be admitting defeat. In actuality it is recognizing reality and acting as a faithful steward of the gifts God has given the congregation."

Legacy: from the book "The God of the How and When" by Kathie Lee Gifford with Rabbi Jason Sobel, "Abraham left a great legacy. He wasn't perfect, but he obeyed God when it mattered most.... Because God had a plan for Abraham, we can celebrate him and his legacy today." "Sarah's legacy is that she journeyed faithfully with God. She endured hardship. She made mistakes. And she experienced God's grace. This is a legacy that we can all share – simply journeying with God as we experience ups and downs. The rock bottoms and mountain tops, all the while feeling His presence and hearing His voice."

GOD IS HERE; GOD IS THERE

As we are about to leave Bethlehem soon, here's some scriptures, hopefully, to help us on our journey to serve God elsewhere:

Jesus said, "Behold the hour is coming, indeed it has come, when you will be scattered, each to his own home. Yet, I am not alone, for the Father is with me. I have said these things to you, that in me you might have peace." John 16:32

Genesis 28:15 - **Behold, I am with you and will keep you wherever you go.**

Joshua 1:9 "Be strong and courageous. Do not be frightened, and do not be dismayed, for the Lord your God is with you wherever you go."

Adam and Eve were commanded to go and so was Noah, Abraham, Ruth, the Prophets and Disciples. Although these people had a rough time of it, they went where God wanted them to go. As they went, God was beside them, and may you rely on God wherever you go. He will be there with you.

THE STORY BEHIND THE HYMN

Alas! and Did My Savior Bleed

Written in 1707

But God forbid that I should boast except in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ. Galatians 6:14

After his graduation from college, Isaac Watts returned to Southampton, England, and spent two years writing hymns for Above Bar Congregational Church. He then moved to London to tutor children in a wealthy family. While there he joined Mark Lane Independent Chapel. Soon he was asked to be a teacher in the church, and in 1698, he was hired as associate pastor. There, on his

twenty-fourth birthday, he preached his first sermon. In 1702, he became senior pastor of the church. He was a brilliant Bible student, and his sermons brought the church to life. Poor health forced him to retire in 1712 but he continued writing. He never married.

In 1707, his Hymns and Spiritual Songs was published. Isaac had written most of these hymns in Southampton while in his late teens and early twenties. Included was a hymn now considered the finest hymn ever written in the English language, "When I Survey the Wondrous Cross". It was based on Galatians 6:14: "But God forbid that I should boast except in the cross of our Lord Jesus Christ." In an enlarged 1709 edition, Watts rewrote the lines to say:


When I survey the wondrous cross On which the Prince of glory died, My richest gain I count but loss, And pour contempt on all my pride.

Another hymn in the book was "Alas! and Did My Savior Bleed." This hymn later played a major role in the conversion of a great American hymnist. In 1851, Fanny Crosby, 31, attended a revival service at John Street Methodist Church in New York. "After a prayer was offered," she recalled, "they began to sing the grand old consecration hymn, 'Alas! and Did My Savior Bleed' and when they reached the third line of the fifth stanza, 'Here, Lord, I give myself away,' my very soul was flooded with celestial light."

How right that Watts should, long after his death, play a part in winning to Christ the author of a new generation of hymns and gospel songs!

Jesus' followers had given up hope when their Lord was crucified, but their hope was renewed on the first Easter when the resurrected Christ met them. One of our last services will be an Easter service. This will remind us to keep our faith strong.

Dear Bethlehem Family,

Here is a quick review of the missions we support through the Missions Board:

LCMS Disaster Response: "We love because he first loved us." (1 John 4:19). Helping the hurting amid disaster

The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod's Disaster Response ministry responds to immediate and long-term needs following natural and man-made disasters.

Working through LCMS districts and congregations as well as with international Lutheran churches and other partners, LCMS Disaster Response builds capacity of the church's partners to respond to needs with Christian care.

The ministry reaches out to LCMS congregations and their communities with services that include on-site assessment, emergency relief and development grants, pastoral care for LCMS church workers and members, and other resources.



Lutheran Communities Services Northwest (LCSNW): This mission has many wonderful programs that they do! We will be having a Missions Sunday in April to hear more about them and how our financial support funds the program that are listed here.

Refugee and Immigrant Services: They believe in the American dream. That's why LCSNW helps people who've endured the unimaginable to pursue it. This is one of the programs they do that I heard a webinar

of Zoom sessions just on this topic. They work with refugees at least 3 years and even up to five years. LCSNW makes sure their refugees are settled and established well into the community. They will start helping people from the Ukraine soon. They use all of the following services to help the refugees and many other people too.

Behavioral Health Services: They partner with thousands of people to help the people that they service to journey from addiction, trauma and mental health issues to recovery, hope and happiness.

<u>Family and Community Support</u>: They are working to break generational cycles of poverty and trauma to make a powerful positive impact on people and communities.

<u>Child Welfare Program</u>: They believe all children deserve homes where they feel safe and loved. That's why LCSNW works to ensure that neglected,

abused, parentless and other at-risk children are surrounded by loving families.

Aging and Independent Living: They believe our communities are richer when seniors and people with disabilities are part of the social fabric. Crime Victim Services: LCSNW stands with victims of crimes to offer personal support, connections to services that aid with healing and recovery, and assistance through investigative and legal processes.



LUTHERAN Lutheran Hour Ministries: Lutheran Hour Ministries began at the grassroots level as the MINISTRIES Lutheran Laymen's League, a group of 12 laypeople who came together to support the church in word and deed. What began as 12 has become a

movement of tens of thousands of volunteers and supporters around the globe. In 1930, "There is a God" were the first words spoken to The Lutheran Hour radio program Gospel message with people around the world more than 163 million times each week through ministry efforts such as Bible Correspondence Courses, Outreach Training, Bible Studies, Daily Devotions and, of course, The Lutheran Hour. I like the free online daily devotional app.

Lutheran Ministry Services

Lutheran Ministries Services Northwest: "I was sick and you visited Me." Matthew 25:36. Lutheran Ministry Services Northwest (LMSN) is a non-profit organization that provides pastoral and spiritual care to individuals and their families in Seattle area hospitals, nursing homes, and jails / prisons. LMSN also serves as the Coordinator for Prison Ministry for the Northwest District of the Lutheran Church Missouri Synod. This is the ministry that Ruth Ann Shimoi works with.



REACH: REACH works to provide everyone in our community a sustainable, healthy, and full life, with special care directed to the marginalized. They seek to embody the belief that every life has innate worth by providing shelter, hot meals, clothing, supplies & other resources. Bethlehem is one of the founders of REACH. REACH stands for **R**enton **E**cumenical **A**ssociation of **Ch**urches. Our donated funds go to help provide meals, special activities like celebrating Christmas, maintaining the Center of Hope facilities, and help pay for folks getting in an apartment. Fenice Fregoso came to our church last May for Mission Sunday on REACH. Their address is 300 Rainier Ave. N, near the Renton airport.



Renton Prep Academy: Renton Prep is no ordinary school. With multiple awards and recognitions, our Micro-School is the pioneer in private, Christian education. Renton Prep opens the door for families to provide the best foundation for their children's future. They teach students

K-12 in a very personalized environment. David Paul Zimmerman was a guest pastor and missions Sunday presenter of Renton Prep Academy at Bethlehem this past summer.

Once-member of Bethlehem congregation, Betty Rich, will help us with our Mary Martha archives and closing procedures.


