DEPART IN PEACE

Sunday, April 30, was the final worship service at Bethlehem. It was an emotion-filled morning. We thank Pastor Flath. We thank James Hing. We thank those who assisted with the service, and we thank all who attended.

After everyone received Holy Communion, after the final prayer was spoken and the final hymn was sung, all items from the altar were removed and carried out to the narthex during the recession. Members followed into the narthex and stood as Pastor Flath spoke these words, *"This church building is closed as a place of divine services in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen. Bethlehem Lutheran Church of Renton, Washington is now officially closed in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit. Amen."*

He then closed the doors to the sanctuary.

"Let us bless the Lord. The LORD bless you and keep you. The LORD make His face shine upon you and be gracious unto you. The LORD lift up His countenance upon you and give you peace. Amen. Christ is risen. He is risen indeed. Amen. Depart in peace. Amen."

Thoughts From The Pastor

Brothers and sisters in Christ: Christ is risen! He is risen indeed -- hallelujah!

As I put these thoughts together in the last half of April 2023, the following question came to mind.

What are we to do as disciples of Jesus Christ after April 30, 2023?

A number of the Bible verses have been going through my mind as Bethlehem Lutheran Church approaches its last service and then the selling of its property. One set of verses that stood out is 1 Thessalonians 5, verses 16-18. **Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you.** (1 Thessalonians 5:16-18 ESV)

This is the very same thing that we are to be doing right now as Jesus' disciples!

However, often times **the will of God in Christ Jesus** for us disciples of Jesus may be a **difficult** and **challenging road** to follow. That's because often in our life there are set-backs, personal health issues, disasters, family difficulties, world events, and especially death, that can throw up some mighty large challenges for us to do the will of God in our living. Yet this portion of God's Word tells us that **God's will** for us His dearly beloved children is: **rejoice always, pray without ceasing, and give thanks**

Betty is remembered as a vibrant cheerful person, a teacher, and a woman who loved being with people. Her quick wit, zest for life, and genuine interest in people made her a delight to converse with. We were blessed to have her as a church member.

She is survived by daughter Linda Sue (Sterling Kuhlman), son John, 2 granddaughters, 4 step-granddaughters, 4 great grandchildren, 2 great great grandchildren, and numerous nieces and nephews.

Since Bethlehem is not available for services, her funeral was held at Sunset Community Church (formerly called Calvary Baptist) in the Renton Highlands with Chaplain Arthur Werzner officiating.

Her service was held at 11:00 a.m. on Saturday, June 3rd at Sunset Community Church followed by a reception in the fellowship hall and graveside at Greenwood Memorial Cemetery. On a table at the reception was the small wooden cross that we used at her husband Jack's funeral reception at Bethlehem. It was a way to bring a little of Bethlehem to her service.

in all circumstances. *All circumstances* include doing God's will as Bethlehem Lutheran Church closes.

So, how does **the will of God** work its way out in our individual life at this time and in our future?

These Bible verses in 1 Thessalonians 5 about God's will for us begin with **rejoice always**.

Someone might be thinking: what's there to rejoice about with the congregation closing and all of the members having to find a new church home?

An approaching death is coming to Bethlehem Lutheran Church in Renton, Washington – this dear gathering place of God's forgiven people around the Word of God and the sacraments. But this death **has not won**. **Jesus has won the victory** over sin, the devil, death, the grave, and all the consequences of sin -- including the closing of this congregation. Jesus Christ's victory over all that is evil is now our victory through faith in Jesus' redeeming work for us.

Even in the midst of our tears, sorrow, pain, and sense of loss at the closing of Bethlehem Lutheran Church, we **can** and **should** rejoice. We read in Philippians: **rejoice in the Lord always; and again I say, rejoice!** (Philippians 4:4 RSV). We certainly **don't** rejoice that the congregation is closing. But our rejoicing **centers** around the person and work of Jesus Christ for us and His faithfulness to us.

God promises us that nothing can separate us from His love for us in Christ Jesus our Lord -- not even the closing of this beloved congregation! Therefore, we **rejoice in the Lord always** because His goodness and mercy to us endures forever!

On top of that, we rejoice because Jesus, the Good Shepherd, promises to take care of us who are part of His flock each and every day wherever we are. Jesus is with us today. Jesus will always be with us in all the days ahead as well, wherever we might be. So, let's continue to **rejoice in the Lord always!**

God's will for us is also that we Christians **pray without ceasing** -- that we always keep on praying.

Prayer is speaking with God our heavenly Father and sharing with Him everything that is on our mind and in our heart, and doing our communicating with God in Jesus' name. And let's remember that the Holy Spirit **helps** us in our praying. He leads us to **pray** for our loved ones, for various situations in the world, for the sharing of the good news that Jesus is the Savior, for our enemies, for our fellow believers, for those who are ill, and even to pray for ourself.

Praying should always be an important part of our life as a disciple of Jesus. We **shouldn't** reserve praying as a kind of last resort -- like, when all else fails, then we

better pray. Rather, prayer should be at the very heart of our life as a Christian. Let's take seriously Jesus' thoughts on praying recorded in the Gospel of Luke chapter 18: ***always pray, so that you don't lose heart*** (Luke 18:1). May the Holy Spirit help us all to keep on praying, day in and day out.

Finally, it is God's will for believers in Jesus Christ to ***give thanks in all circumstances***.

God wants us to have and to live a thankful life -- ***in all circumstances*** -- that is, in every situation of life. We can have a "thanks filled" life as we remember with gratitude all that Jesus has done and continues to do for us each day. The spiritual blessings that we have as disciples of Jesus Christ -- such as the forgiveness of sins, life, salvation, and all the other blessings -- ***do not change*** just because the circumstances and situations in our life, in our families, in our community and world, or in our congregation change. Thank God for that!

May our God continue to bless each one of us with a thankful heart that ***sees past*** the moment to the great truths of the Christian faith. The "things" happening in our personal life and all around us ***do not change the facts that*** Jesus Christ's death on the cross was for us as well as for all people, ***that*** forgiveness of all of our sins is still ours, ***that*** the changeless Jesus is always with us, ***that*** eternal life awaits us when we die, and ***that*** Jesus lives -- Jesus' victory over all evil is ours through faith!

So especially now and in the days ahead, ***we thank*** our great God and heavenly Father, ***with joy*** in our heart, that He has brought us His dear children to faith in His Son Jesus Christ. At this time, we ***especially*** thank God for all the lives that have been touched by the Gospel of Jesus Christ over the past 80 plus years through the efforts of Bethlehem Lutheran Church in this part of the world.

May the peace and love and words of the Good Shepherd, Jesus Christ, continue to keep us faithful to Jesus, comfort us now, and continue to guide us on our journey down the narrow path to heaven.

After April 30, 2023, wherever we might be worshipping our living Lord and Savior, may the Holy Spirit help us disciples of Jesus Christ to continue to ***rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances; because this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you.***

Christ is risen! He is risen indeed -- hallelujah!

May the love of the Lord Jesus always be in your heart!

The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ and the love of God and the fellowship of the Holy Spirit be with you all. (2 Corinthians 13:14 ESV)

A friendly gathering of lifelong members, extended family, members who have moved away, local pastors and their wives, and friends of Bethlehem followed the liturgy led by Pastor Flath & listened to stories of our past from Pastors Grauer and Baade. Rev Dr Paul Linnemann, President of our Northwest District, reminded us that we are turning a page today in our story and that God has a promise for us. "*I know the plans I have for you," declares the Lord, "plans to give you a hope and a future."* Pastor Linnemann shared, "What's ahead is a hope and a future that God already has set aside and set apart for you."

Congregational President Don Kuhlmann read our resolution of closure that had been adopted by the congregation and handed Pastor Linnemann our church records for safekeeping so that the work of God and His people may not be forgotten.

OUR CLOSING SERVICE — SUNDAY APRIL 30 Disposition of the Church Building

Pastor Richard Flath led our final service. Each of our elders, Brent Begalka, Jim Buechler, and Richard Taylor, read Bible verses. Communion was served in the traditional table style, and we sang the Lord's Prayer together for the last time. Many banners were on display in the sanctuary and the social hall. Our final hymn sung at Bethlehem Lutheran Church was "God Be with You Till We Meet Again". An article about the song can be found on page 36.

Then came the time in the service for the removal of our sacred items. It was quiet except for the crying and Pastor Flath's words. Dick Taylor handed each item, slowly and respectfully to a church member as Pastor Flath explained its significance to us as individuals, and its importance to Christianity. After the lectern, pulpit, and altar were bare, Logan Browning led the recession to the narthex.





Yet, JOY, great JOY at the wonderful memories that we shared with BLC over 3 ½ years of Gospel ministry together! February birthday celebrations; Mother-daughter teas, outdoor Covid Holy Communion services, Cropwalk fundraisers, outdoor picnics, preaching sitting down on Zoom for over a year ... just to name a few!

JOY also in the knowledge that even though individual congregations close, the Church does not! Jesus promised Peter that "the gates of Hell would not prevail against his church" (Matthew 16:18). We do not know what the future holds, but we DO KNOW who holds the future!

We have experienced a lot of change in our lives (even without Covid!). We will experience even more in the days ahead ... some change will be perceived as good, some as not. No matter what, our hope must not be placed in our circumstances but in Christ Jesus alone who has conquered all circumstances and caused them to work for our good! At our last landscaping work party on April 27, we planted, weeded, trimmed, mowed, and swept.


Our break reward was Irish soda bread with butter and strawberry jam, and coffee.

OUR MEMORIES

I was called to be pastor of Bethlehem Lutheran Church in Renton, Washington, in the Spring of 1975. Bethlehem was an exciting community to serve. There was a healthy mixture of all ages and interests. The church buzzed with activity. There were children everywhere. I remember being surrounded by little kids in the chancel on Easter Sunday morning, while they were told the story of the First Easter. When the women approached the Tomb and said "Who will roll away the stone?" One of the children piped up "Carl will do it!" Carl was easily the biggest and strongest man in the congregation. Ken Crossman blessed us by directing the church choir, and we had a very strong youth group, JOY IN HYMN.

We also had our struggles: during Holy Week in 1980 an arsonist set the Social Hall, office, and Narthex on fire. Thankfully, the Sanctuary was not harmed, although it smelled like smoke on Easter Sunday. The Lord turned that experience into a blessing. Our congregation restored Bethlehem's building by doubling the Social Hall and kitchen, the Sunday School rooms, the offices and Narthex. In 1984 I experienced another great blessing when Beth and I were married in our Sanctuary. I will always be grateful to the people of Bethlehem for welcoming her so openly, and helping her adjust to life with a pastor and three children.

Our church showed how open her doors were: we sponsored refugees from Vietnam, we helped form REACH, the Renton Ecumenical Association of Churches, and the annual Crop Walk.

I am honored to have been a part of Bethlehem's history, and I thank our God for the years we spent together. You have been a blessing, and you will be a blessing wherever the path of God leads you.

In 1995 the Begalka family was looking for a small, friendly Lutheran church to attend. So when Ruth Ann Shimoi asked us to join her at Bethlehem Lutheran Church (BLC) for a Thanksgiving morning worship service, we agreed because we had never heard of a Thanksgiving Church service before. Ruth Ann introduced us to Pastor Baade & Joyce, Jenny Iles, Pat Boydston, Ellen Taylor, Elsie Hill and the Humphreys. They all made us feel welcome with their genuine friendliness. So we went to the worship service the next Sunday morning. During coffee hour we met and forgot the names of about 70 friendly people. I called Joel, Dick and Dick, James. Eventually, I learned everyone's names. I was impressed with the fellowship and learned that several of them were from the Dakotas, like my husband's Dad's family. There were also a bunch of kids running around about the same age as our kids. Soon we transferred our membership from King of Kings Lutheran Church to Bethlehem.

Sunday, March 24, 1996 was our daughter Brenda's 8th birthday. She asked to have clowns for her birthday. I told her that I don't think clowns worked on Sundays. So as we went to church, I could hear Brenda praying to God to send her some clowns. To our surprise, the Bethlehem Clowns did a skit during the church service. Then after the service Brenda hugged each one of them, saying, "I knew God would bring me clowns for my birthday." So she got her picture taken by a Polaroid camera with the clowns surrounding her. She was elated. Her brother, Aaron, was embarrassed as his picture was taken with a blue-haired clown.

I taught Bethlehem Lutheran Preschool from 1996 - 2013. I had volunteer assistants for the first few years. Among them were Shirley Eliason, Pat Boydston, Myrtle Lotto and Mamie Thirion. Kathy Zable, Wanda Brooks and others also helped with craft materials and kits. Pastor Baade held Chapel for us once a month and Joyce Baade had story time. Our favorite story was Dr. Seuss' "Scary Pants." Also Pat Boydston & Ellen Taylor put on Puppet Shows for us once a month. The last Preschool assistant I had was LuAnne Humphrey. I participated in Vacation Bible School until 2019. Favorite themes of VBS were cities of the Holy Land and one VBS had a Hawaiian theme.

We never missed the Mother/Daughter Tea from 1996-2018. The very first one we attended, my daughter and I had matching dresses. Then from 2008- 018, my granddaughter, Alissa, joined her mother and me.

Both Aaron and Brenda were both confirmed by Pastor Baade at BLC. Aaron was confirmed with Chris (Guy Holcomb's step son) and Halley Kuhlmann, and 2 years later Brenda was confirmed with Tracy Brown's son, Adam, and Jon Kuhlmann.

One year I remember a Talent Show. Mark and LuAnne Humphrey sang the "Green Acres" theme song; Leon Holcomb's children did a skit about "There's a Hole in the Bucket;" Doug Gardner, Brent and Karen Begalka played a squawky clarinet trio of "Sentimental Journey;" and The Preschool did a pantomime of a Mariner's baseball

game. There were other participants as well. However, the Grand Finale was the Elders' version of the "Village People" as they sang their songs. They topped it off with the YMCA song, getting the audience involved with the motions.

Two other big events I remember was the trip to Butchart Gardens, north of Victoria B.C. and our Hawaiian Luau at Bethlehem. They were impressive!

Other activities that my husband and I enjoyed a lot were singing in the choir, going to Mariners games, bus trips to Canada, Leavenworth or other events with church members, movie matinees, learning how to Zoom, the Bethlehem Star, Everybody's Birthday Party, potlucks and coffee hour, Game Nights, Pinochle, Bible studies, Fund raisers, giving to charities, teaching and learning.

I have enjoyed every Pastor we have had at Bethlehem, beginning with Pastor Baade. The people are what I will miss the most. "Some are dead and some are living. In my life I've loved them all." (to quote a Beatles' song). I wanted to talk about them all, but there were over 100 members since 1995 who have been promoted to Heaven and about 100 others who are living, but have moved on to other things or places. I knew at least half of them well. Right now we have at least 50 active members left: some on Zoom and some in person and they all have been special to me. I find that my memory of things from the past are not very accurate, but the love and appreciation for the people of Bethlehem will go with me as we part. We all will meet again in Heaven some day.

A fun summary: Esther was there at the start of Bethlehem in 1942 and helped commemorate its closing with joyful fruit bouquets. She is looking down at Bethlehem and smiling.

Remembrances of Bethlehem began for me when my folks, Joyce & Kenneth Crossman, moved to Renton, transferring to Bethlehem from St. Paul Lutheran, in Boise, Idaho. I flew home for breaks from Concordia Teacher's College, Seward, Nebraska, worshipping with the congregation under the shepherding of Rev. Walther F. Luttmann and wife Millie. Pretty special as the Rev. Luttmann family were dear friends from Minnesota, to Idaho then to Washington. My father, Kenneth, became the Choir Director, building a large choir to share praise to our God. I sang with and under my dad's leadership. One special memory was on Christmas Eves, dad would always have me sing a solo, 'Lullaby on Christmas Eve' by F. Melius Christiansen, from the balcony in the dark quiet candle light. I cherish that memory. But there are many more of course, like so many of you have of worship here at Bethlehem.

I taught Bible School during college summer breaks, for excited happy children as they grew in their knowledge of Jesus and His great love for us. I helped Rev. Luttmann's children (my friends) fold Sunday bulletins on Saturday during summer. Other remembrances were worshipping with my parents, cousin Raymond and wife Marilyn; Marilyn's funeral; later worshipping with cousin Raymond and wife Patricia; then Raymond's funeral, singing the Lord's Prayer; Pastor and I bringing our children to worship with their grandparents; celebrating my parents 40th then 50th Wedding Anniversaries with special worship services having their grandchildren singing; attending the lovely Mother/Daughter luncheons to celebrate Mother's Day; church picnics; big rummage sales; the joyous Bell Choir with bells given in memory of my dad from my mother; and both my parents - Kenneth's and Joyce's funeral services.

Now we are in 2023, worshipping once again, with my husband Rev. Richard Flath leading Bethlehem in worship as you come upon closure. I, like many of you, am very sad. However, we are safely in the Lord's hands. May each of you find another caring church home where you can continue to worship our risen Savior with joy. May God hold you close in His abiding love. Rejoice, we will be together again with our loving Lord in the glories of heaven.

Dearly beloved at former Bethlehem Lutheran Church—you are still BLC spiritually and at heart.

Joyce and I just returned from being away nearly a month, about three weeks of which were in northern Scotland—Edinburgh all the way around the northern districts of the country. It was a jagged, up and down circular journey around the Highlands that took us through unpronounceable named villages, castle ruins, the magical Isle of Skye, up and around to the North Sea and John O' Groats, and finally down across the Cairngorms and through Balmoral's castle grounds. Of our 1,300 plus miles, we drove far more of them on one-lane roads than otherwise. Even though, on much of our route it was sparingly trafficked except for the tourist destinations, when approaching vehicles were met, we took turns at frequently-placed narrow turn-outs that allowed two vehicles to pass. We nodded and waved at each other when we passed one another.

Perhaps this is a kind of metaphor for Bethlehem. BLC in its 80 years has come full circle. Sometimes on the route we were on a freeway that collectively sped along; sometimes we were on a one-lane road. But we were never strangers meeting but once, never to see one another again.

Mostly, because of the close-knit, family character of Bethlehem, we met one another coming and going several times a week. This blessed and enriched all of our lives. The neat, blessed thing is that we always took turns making room for one another and we "waved"—but more frequently conversed—in a friendly, and almost always loving fashion as we did so, whether it was at the altar receiving Communion together, or at the parish hall hot food counter! We started from our personal homes and went to our church home and returned home again, each time with a memory and a blessing of Christian fellowship.

I learned upon returning from Scotland that there was to be a last BLC newsletter. Diilda invited me to contribute a short piece of memory loss. I am pleased that Joyce is contributing a short piece of memory retention!

At the public service on April 29th, I remembered incidents and certain individuals at Bethlehem. I regret that I left a lot of BLC members "out" when I did so. It was not possible to relate a story about every member.

What I do want to say here is to reassure you that I could have produced words of gratitude and a story for every one of you whom I knew at BLC. Some stories would be stories of griefs felt and observed. Some would be filled with laughter. I want to assure each and every one of you that you were special to us and to me as your pastor. I have wonderful

memories of you and could say kind words about each of you if there was space. And then there are all the people who have been called Home to Heaven.

What I will say is that I would like to meet you again on "the road." I would like to greet and make room for you as you would for me, and more than give you a nod and a wave, embrace you with the love of Christ for both of us.

Favorite Memories of Mary Martha By Its Members

The earliest and most popular memory among our Mary Martha members was the turkey dinners. They were for special annual events, particularly the Holiday Bazaar. It included turkey, creamed turkey gravy, dressing, mashed potatoes made from scratch, green beans, Jello salad, homemade rolls with dessert of pumpkin pie or apple pie. Originally this meal was 25 cents! Shirley & Jim Fraidenburg loved carving the turkey. Several people worked from 6 am until 8 pm. The Bazaar would begin at 11 am. They catered to the neighborhood and Boeing employees who would come after work. The Bazaar would fund everything Mary Martha would do for the entire year. It was a huge fundraiser.

Originally there were 2 groups: LWML was more of a Bible Study for the younger women of Bethlehem interested in missions. Mary Martha, which was a more mature group, spent most of the time making crafts, sewing, making banners and serving at receptions, especially weddings, funerals and memorial services. LWML met at 7 pm so the working women could attend after work, and Mary Martha mostly worked on projects or receptions during the day.

Both groups would attend retreats together and work together on the Bazaar. Especially during World War II, everybody worked together and helped each other out because they were all "in the same boat" as Ellen Taylor put it. After 1970 when they first amended the 1946 original by-laws, the 2 groups eventually became one.

Long ago, in the 1950s, Mary Martha/LWML membership were huge and their roster of members were 2 pages long. There was no formal voting or rigid formalities. Someone would make a motion, it would be seconded & everyone would agree to whatever it was. The meetings were groups of ladies gathering, talking, sewing and doing things. Whenever a lady had a birthday she put pennies in the MITE box representing each year of her age.

Ellen Taylor joined LWML and Mary Martha while she was teaching, but she wasn't able to be very active until later. Several of the members we now have joined in the late 60s: Pat Eskam, Joanne Jordanger, Jeanne-K Hughes. Most of the Mary Martha/LWML members joined because a friend or relative invited them or brought them. Judy Johnson brought Pat Eskam. Alpha Burpee and Shirley Eliason encouraged Jeanne-K Hughes to join and Shirley even made her a MITE box. Later, Shirley Eliason also encouraged Cathy Wooden and Dielda Kuhlmann to join. Myrtle Lotto

asked Joanne Jordanger to join. Pat Boydston brought Marjie when McKayla was a baby. Carolyn Troseth brought her daughter Camille when she was yet a teenager who joined Mary Martha. Then several joined in the late 80s or 90s: Sharon Buechler, Marlene Holcomb, Cathy Wooden, Marjie Boydston, Diilda Kuhlmann, Tracy Brown and Karen Begalka. Our newest Mary Martha member, Amber Wolf, first attended Bethlehem Lutheran Church when she was pregnant, then joined Mary Martha when her daughter began Kindergarten.

Most of these women worked outside of the home and all of them had children, but they gave of themselves to help Bethlehem Lutheran Church, various missions or individuals and to continue the Kingdom of God. God will go with them wherever they go next.






THE STORY BEHIND THE HYMN

God Be With You

Written in 1880

Grace, mercy, and peace will be with you from God the Father and from the Lord Jesus Christ, the Son of the Father, in truth and love. 2 John 3

On September 19, 1945, missionary Darlene Deibler was liberated from the Japanese Prison Camp at Kampili, seventeen days after Japan had signed the Instrument of Surrender aboard the USS Missouri. She was in bad shape, having been subjected to years of physical suffering and mental torture.

Eight years before, Darlene and her husband, Russell, had landed as missionaries in New Guinea. Plunging into the work, they were making solid progress in building a growing church, aided by Darlene's dear friend and mentor, Dr. Robert Jaffray. Now both Russell and Dr. Jaffray were dead, and Darlene was leaving behind two lonely white crosses on the hillside. As a 28-year-old widow, she was returning home without a single possession. All her mementos and private keepsakes were gone, her loved ones were dead, and her body was debilitated by exhaustion, starvation, malaria, beriberi, and dysentery.

For over four years, she had witnessed atrocities that can scarcely be described. Prisoners all around her had suffered horrible deaths, and she herself had seen the inside of death cells. During that time, not one letter or package had reached her.

As the boat carried her from her island prison, she prayed a bitter prayer: "Lord, I'll never come to these islands again. They've robbed me of everything that was most dear to me."

Suddenly she heard voices, Indonesian voices ringing from the distance. There on the shore were those who had come to know the Lord through her mission, raising their voices, singing: "God be with you till we meet again. / By His counsels guide, uphold you, / With His sheep securely fold you; / God be with you till we meet again."

Darlene later wrote in her autobiography, *Evidence Not Seen*: "This song released the waters of bitterness that had flooded my soul, and the hurt began to drain from me as my tears flowed in a steady stream. The healing had begun. I knew then that some day, God only knew when, I would come back to these my people and my island home."
