And love the people in our lives like we have never loved before.


If we treat each other with respect and more often wear a smile,

Members who passed away in the last 12 months will be honored at our All Saints' Service on November 6, 2022.



Wanda Brooks was our most senior member. She passed away at the age of 102 1/2 at home on September 22, 2022. Wanda was born in Chicago on February 4, 1920. After her mother died, she was raised in an orphanage. Her first husband, Ken Johnson, died in 1949. Three years later, she married Berle Brooks. They were married for 66 years until he passed away in 2018. Wanda & Berle joined Bethlehem in 1966.

Wanda's funeral was held at Greenwood Memorial on October 12. She had selected the songs for her service: Ave Maria, Amazing Grace and Abide With Me.

Wanda lived a life of service and love.



Agnes Brown was 92 years old when she passed away on May 7, 2022. She & her husband, Joe, joined Bethlehem in 1978. Joe died on March 26, 1983. Generations of Browns have worshipped with us at Bethlehem. Her funeral was held on May 21 and led by Pastor Grauer. Pastor Grauer was also the minister who confirmed Aggie as an adult.

Aggie leaves a legacy of love.

Gerhard Muller passed away on November 10, 2021 at the age of 88. He was born in eastern Germany, in what is now Poland. Gerhard and his mother were able to leave Germany in 1946.

Sabine (Heisinger) Muller passed away on July 7, 2022 at the age of 80. She was born in Berlin, Germany during WWII. Unbeknownst to either of them, they left their war-torn country on the same refugee boat. They discovered this after they met in Renton, 2 decades later.

They were married on November 30, 1968 at Bethlehem and spent the rest of their lives worshipping and sharing fellowship here. Their memorial services were held at Bethlehem and conducted by Pastor Baade.

He had a strong Christian faith. Ruth is comforted knowing that he is in heaven, and that Fred knew that's where he was going. His family held a private gathering to celebrate his life.

Benefits of Pruning

It's no secret that the Church in the U.S. is struggling and declining; it's been well-documented in many places. And it's no secret that this places enormous pressures on



pastors and their families and their congregations. But...

What if much of what is happening in the church is a season of pruning?

And it's a season of pruning for many of us as leaders and individuals within the community?

And what if...

God is cutting back branch after branch that bears no fruit in order to drive us—me—back to the Vine for provision and protection?

This pruning season is a season of character building for so many of us and for the Church as a whole?

This pruning kicks prop after prop out from under us so that we only have one Source to rely on?

We can discard so many things that have consumed energy and attention so that we can bear much fruit?

Concentrations of believers gathering in our church buildings are complemented by vibrant communities of believers who represent the Gospel outside our sanctuaries?

A season of pruning leads toward greater fruitfulness and wider influence and not less?

Furthermore, what if God is stirring in the hearts of both an old and a new generation of people? Stirring us to trust Him and listen to Him... To follow Him and participate in His work of carrying the Gospel to a deeply disoriented culture needing to experience the compassion of Christ through us...

Pruning is a hard season!

I understand it to be a gift...if I can see it that way! Pruning builds character of faith. It brings humility and deals with pride. It leads to perseverance. It brings clarity and focus. It drives us to our knees. It makes us fit for God's purpose.

Finally, pruning brings realism. We clearly realize that the vision God places in our hearts is impossible to accomplish on our own. We can't do it.

I am the vine; you are the branches. If you remain in me and I in you, you will bear much fruit; apart from me you can do nothing. (John 15:5)

A wonderful, godly leader couple with their own small vineyard brought some enlightenment to my Midwest farm boy roots of corn and soybeans. There's no pruning on the farm, but there is on a vineyard.

Pruning was never part of my vision frame in leading a congregation! I always wanted to see the graphs pointing up and to the right! Growth... more... better... new... And if we weren't? Something was wrong and we needed to fix it.

It never occurred to me that we needed a season for pruning and that what needed to be fixed was in me and not in a program or ministry area. I'm not sure I'd know how to lead a church or organization through a season of pruning other than starting with, "Maybe we should look more closely at John 15." And, "What if this is a season of pruning so that God can more deeply draw us into the vine for greater fruitfulness?"

And, my best shot at leading would be to embrace the season of pruning for myself.

More and more I see that whatever I lead, it all starts with me, and me living and embracing it.

...even when I'd rather just preach a sermon about it instead!

I don't quickly recognize my own seasons of pruning. My natural reflex is to work harder, longer, call for greater commitment from the crowd, wrestle with my own sense of failing and even pull away from the Vine. It seems counter intuitive that we would be preparing for a season of fruitfulness by embracing a season of clipping and cutting back! However...

...apart from me you can do nothing...

A man wanted to teach his four sons an important lesson, so he sent each one to observe a pear tree. The first son went during winter and discovered the tree was ugly and twisted. The second found the tree full of fresh spring buds. The third son observed the tree in summer, laden with blossoms. The final son visited in fall and found the pear tree ripe with fruit. The father explained no tree can be judged on one season alone.



We all go through challenging times, but it's important not to let the discomfort of one season destroy the joy of the rest. Are you in a new season? Perhaps you're recently retired, empty nesting, or widowed. Maybe you're starting a new career or raising children. No matter your season or circumstance, you always have at least one of the following three things to offer.

TIME. When kids are young, a parent's time is broken into small increments. There's very little capacity and a million demands. But as we age, we settle into a slower, more manageable pace where we can volunteer or serve in unique ways. Do you have time you can give to someone in need, or to an organization you care about?

TALENT. Whether you're in the process of building a career or preparing to retire, you have talents and skills you've developed - designed by God to benefit others. Is this a season where your talents can help bring advancement or attention to a cause you're passionate about? 1 Peter says we're called to use our gifts to serve others as faithful stewards of God's grace.

TREASURE. It's often said, "Those who can no longer go, send." Many elder adults find themselves less physically equipped to volunteer, but more focused on the legacy they'll leave behind. These individuals carry a deep treasure - a legacy of values they want to pass along to loved ones, or financial gifts for organizations like Lutheran Hour Ministries or Bethlehem Lutheran Church. Every day, more people decide to turn their estate plan into a legacy of love.

THE STORY BEHIND THE HYMN

For the Beauty of the Earth 1864

Therefore You are great, O Lord God. For there is none like You, nor is there any God besides You, according to all that we have heard with our ears.

2 Samuel 7:22

Folliot Sandford Pierpoint—that's the unlikely name of the author of this great hymn. Folliot was born October 7, 1835, in Bath, England. After graduating from Cambridge, he taught at Somersetshire College in his home area of Bath.



Folliot Sandford Pierpoint 1835—1917 England

One day when he was 29, Folliot found himself walking in the countryside on a beautiful Spring day. He saw the ocean of green, the blue dome of heaven, and the winding Avon River cutting through the flowery landscape. Overwhelmed with God's creative brilliance, he wrote this poem. He intended it primarily for Communion services in the Anglican Church, but when it jumped the Atlantic, it quickly became associated with the American Thanksgiving holiday.

Because he had received an inheritance, he did not need a regular teaching position and could afford the leisure of personal study and writing. He wrote three volumes of poetry and several hymns. "For the Beauty of the Earth" is the only Pierpont hymn still sung today.

This hymn is not in our hymnals but the same melody is used in LSB #397 "As With Gladness Men of Old". The music was written by Conrad Kocher.

"For the Beauty of the Earth" is one of only a few songs <u>devoted purely to giving thanks</u>. One of the strange things about the "attitude of gratitude" is that we tend to exhibit it in reverse proportion to the number of blessings received. The more we have, the less thankful we are.


Ralph Waldo Emerson observed that if the constellations appeared only once in a thousand years, imagine what an exciting event it would be. But because they're there every night, we barely give them a look.

One of the evidences of the Holy Spirit's work in our lives is a gradual reversal of that pattern. God wants to make us people who exhibit a thankfulness in proper proportion to the gifts and blessings we've received.

Why not take time to sing this hymn to the Lord right now?

CHURCHES AROUND THE WORLD

If you visit a church during your travels, you can submit a photo and favorite memory of it to Dielda, newsletter editor.



From their recent trip, **Hannelore & Pete Maas**, share this photo of Our Lady of Sorrow, Catholic Church in Santa Barbara, California. Their congregation was formed in 1782 to serve the parish of the Spanish army. Their first building was destroyed by fire in 1865. Their second building was destroyed by a 6.8 Richter earthquake in 1925. This current building was built in 1929 and is a designated landmark of Santa Barbara.

Jeanne-K & Edward Hughes were married in Memorial Lutheran Church in Vancouver, Washington in 1971. Memorial became an official church in 1943 so they will be celebrating their 80th anniversary next year.



Coincidently this church worshipped in a surplus Army chapel like we did in the 1940's & 50's.

The people who participated in the September **Valley Camp** walk in North Bend got a look inside the chapel. It is kept clean and was surprisingly light inside.

bigger than they appear in the photos. St Michael's Uniting Church is on the left. They have been served by guest pastors for the past 5 years. Their pipe organ has 2,500 pipes. The Scots' Church is on the right. It is a Presbyterian church and offers 3 services on Sunday, with one being in the Indonesian language. The Scots' also operate a food pantry. Queen Elizabeth II visited in 1961.

PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE By Don Kuhlmann

Please take time to read the Pruning article I submitted on page 10. It gives a new perspective of a church when it is in decline. It also made me think of my own life experience with crops.

I grew up on a farm. Our main crop was wheat. In the fall, the wheat would turn yellow. This indicated it was ripe and was time to harvest. At this time of year there was no green in the field. There were no additional heads of grain coming along. The only way to have more wheat was to harvest the yellow grain and replant in the spring to grow another crop. It strikes me that analogy could apply to Bethlehem. While we are not yellow, we are gray and ripe. We have no upcoming generation to take over. We are much like that field of ripe wheat.

God may be harvesting us, the ripe seeds at Bethlehem, and waiting to see these replanted seeds encourage others and help to grow His kingdom in a new place. I am eager to see all the good work growing his Kingdom that can come from His pruning.


